The pedestrians cross where they want for lack of education and for weakness?















Lines of desire of the pedestrian crossings without any facilities

"I cross but running" Señora Mariella, 53 years old

"In order to pay my electricity bill, I need to run across on my way out and back. At my age how am I going to cross? How can I run? I won't risk it. That's why I say: I'm not afraid of dying, I'm old enough to die... but in my bed, not in the street" Señora Quetita, 78 years old
